- 1. Does AZ have enough water to take care of the growth?
- **2. How is AZ water managed**, who are the players, how does AZ water law work.
- 3. The general stream adjudication. A judicial proceeding to determine the nature, extent, and relative priority of water rights in the entire river system both the Gila River and the Little Colorado River system. Priority The ownership of surface water and sub-flow water, the adjudication process, when did it start, where are we at now, the history and stakeholders who are they and how much Arizona is involved. The longest AZ Superior Court case in Maricopa County in the history of the US.
- **4. Where are the sub-flow areas?** Wells drilled in the sub-flow areas in the Sedona Verde Valley & Prescott areas. Active and Non-Active Management areas. Proper filing with the ADWR. How to find them easily and research what has been filed with ADWR. <u>Verde Valley Sub-Flow Report</u>
- 5. What is the job of ADWR? The Department administers all state water laws, except those related to water quality, which come under the jurisdiction of the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality. When they were formed, who regulates them and what are the different things they manage and keep on file. How important is the water filings, accuracy, and historic documentation? How to easily find documents on their site. What is the difference between a water claim and a water right? What is the water law in Arizona? Public Water Code. The Surface Water Code June 1919. What must you do to use surface water? Surface water users prior to 1919, how was it appropriated?
- **6. Ground Water Laws**, Active Management areas, IGR Irrigation Management areas, how are they defined, Non-Active Management areas not under the Ground Water Management Act. Assured Water Supply Rules, CAPP, Surface Waters, Effluent, Recharge, Credits.

- **7. With growth will ground water laws change?** What is being done now to understand necessary changes for positive results in years to come.
- 8. Indian Reservation water claims: History of the Tribes that settled in AZ. Court Proceedings. Who is the Trustee? The difference in Trust lands and Fee lands, how many tribes are involved in AZ., how many have already settled and how many tribes are yet to be settled in the Adjudication. Do tribes sell water to private property users, corporations, subdivisions as a water company? Which Tribes are here in the Sedona Verde Valley and Prescott areas. How much land is reservation lands in the Prescott, Sedona Verde Valley areas.
- 9. Salt River Project, SRP, Our History Runs Deep. What is their history and how have they managed the Verde River? The dams, when did they start filing water claims on the water sheds in the Adjudication, a proceeding created 48 years ago to determine the rights to all surface water in the Gila system, which includes the Verde River and can affect well water users in the Verde Basin. The condition of the Big Chino aquifer and the modeling and monitoring programs used to assess changes in the aquifer and plans for the future. How do they help to create positive outcomes for water users. How have they worked with Verde Valley property owners.
- **10. The fine line of the use of water in AZ.** Balancing farming, food and meat production, domestic use, commercial and industrial use, and mining with conservation, regeneration, and a healthy nature of the waters and wildlife for all to win. Percentages of Water used recharged.
